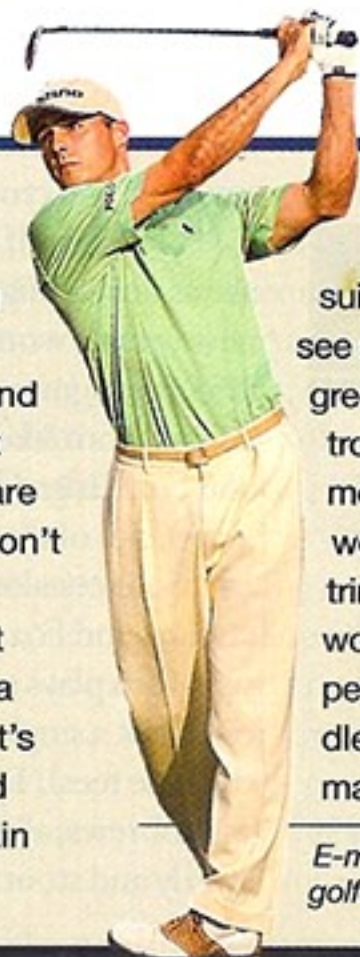

I'll be playing golf at St. Andrews this summer. Any suggestions for Scottish weather conditions?

Invest in waterproof, not water-resistant, rain jackets and pants (Nike Golf, Adidas Golf, FootJoy's DryJoys and Zero Restriction). They can handle rougher weather

conditions. If you're wide and short, pick rain trousers that can be shortened. Wear your golf shoes when you try on rain trousers so they can be hemmed to the appropriate length. And keep in mind that you'll be walking at St. Andrews, so go for trousers that are light and feature belt loops so they won't droop when they get water-logged. Another option is to wait until you get to St. Andrews so you can purchase a Galvin Green rainsuit, a great line that's not sold in the United States. Oh, and bring two pairs of golf shoes and a rain hat—you'll thank me later.
